Mount Royal Area Trail System

Mount Royal Trail – #1 Mason Town Tr. – #9077 Hatties Tr. – #9078,
 Bills Ranch Tr. – #9000, S. Rainbow Tr. – #9002,
 Rainbow Lake Tr. – #9001, Chauncey’s Tr. - 9078 Halfway Stop Tr. - #9076

Difficulty: EASY TO MORE DIFFICULT

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: Mount Royal – 1.2 mi., Mason Town –1.0 mi., Hatties – 0.3 mi., Bills Ranch – 1.3 mi., S. Rainbow – 0.4 mi., Rainbow Lake –0.3 mi., Chauncey’s – 0.4 mi., Halfway Stop - 0.4 mi

Elevation: The trailhead in Frisco is at 9,120 feet. The highest points are at the end of Trail 18 at 10,200 feet and at the junction with the Peak One trail at 10,400.

Elevation Gain: 1,280 feet

Open In Winter To: X-C SKIING, SNOWSHOEING

Open In Summer To: HIKING, HORSE, MTN. BIKING

Access #1: Miners Creek Trailhead in Frisco

- From I-70, take Exit 203 (Frisco) and travel south on Highway 9 for approximately 1.6 miles
- About 0.5 miles past the traffic light at Main Street, turn right at the next traffic light on to County Road 1004 (County Commons)
- Proceed about 200 yards and turn right, then make an immediate left onto the paved recpath.
- The trailhead is on the left about 0.1 miles
- You can park at the trailhead or drive up the recpath then onto the unpaved Miners Creek Road and park by the boulders just past the end of the pavement (about 0.2 miles from the trailhead)

Access #2: Second Avenue Trailhead in Frisco

- From I-70, take Exit 201 (Frisco Main Street) and travel east into the town of Frisco.
- Travel down Main Street to Second Avenue and turn right.
- Proceed to the end of the road just past the crossing of the paved recpath.

Trail Highlights:

- Rainbow Lake is a small body of water that is ideal for a picnic lunch.
- Halfway Stop was the original name of Frisco as it was 1/2 between Leadville and Georgetown.
- Hattie Learned ran the general store in Frisco in the early 1900s and Chauncey Warren was the Frisco stage and hotel manager in the 1870s.

Important information:

- Dog owners - Please be considerate of other trail users. Keep your dog in sight and when you encounter others, call the dog to your side until they pass. Use a stick to remove feces from the trail.
- **Use extreme caution when driving on or crossing the Frisco-Breckenridge recpath.**
