Spruce Creek / Mohawk Lakes Trail System

Spruce Creek Trail – 58 Mayflower Lakes Trail - 58.1A
 Upper Spruce Creek Road – 800

Difficulty: MODERATE

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: Spruce Creek Trail – 3.0 mi., Mayflower Lakes Trail – 0.7 mi., Upper Spruce Cr. – 0.5 mi.

Elevation: The Spruce Creek Trailhead is at 10,164 feet. The highest point is at the Upper Mohawk Lake which is at 12,104 feet.

Elevation Gain: 1,940 feet

Open In Winter To: X-C SKIING, SNOWSHOEING

Open In Summer To: HIKING, HORSE, MTN. BIKING

Access:

- From I-70, take Exit 203, Frisco / Breckenridge and travel south on Highway 9 through Frisco and Breckenridge (approximately 12.6 miles)
- Approximately 2.1 miles past the last traffic signal in Breckenridge (Boreas Pass Road), turn right on to the Spruce Creek Road. Proceed uphill on a dirt road for approximately 0.1 miles then bear left through the intersection.
- After approximately 1.1 miles, you will arrive at the trailhead.
- Park at the Spruce Creek Trailhead or proceed on a rough 4-wheel drive road for 1.3 miles and park at the Mayflower Lakes Trailhead.

Trail Highlights:

- The trails pass through stands of aspen and lodgepole pine.
- Approximately 1.7 miles from the trailhead, you will cross the Wheeler National Recreation Trail. Continue for approximately 0.8 miles then you will encounter an old road. Bear left.
- You will pass by several waterfalls and historic mining structures.
- The trail rises on to a shelf with Lower Mohawk lake nestled against the mountain walls.
- Mount Helen is visible to the north.
- Approximately 0.3 miles past Lower Mohawk Lake is Mohawk Lake.

Important information:

- Mountain bikes may only be used on trails marked with a mountain bike symbol. If there is no sign, it is closed to that use.
- Dog owners - Please be considerate of other trail users. Keep your dog in sight and when you encounter others, call the dog to your side until they pass. Use a stick to remove dog feces from the trail.
